I find it interesting that in the past seven days, God seemed to point back to past events which somehow give relevance to what has been happening these days. Lucy sent me pictures of Covenant EFC's (ECF at that time) first missions trip. What caught my attention is that in this first missions trip, the whole church was involved — a total of 40 adults and children! In 2017, 405 Covenanters took part in 32 short-term missions trips. It is not quite the whole church but it is still more than the 148 Covenanters who participated in 2016. Thank you, church, for stepping forward to win the world for Christ!

Rev Dr Colin Smith shared an extract from the sermon "Propitiation" preached by James Denny in April 1911 during the annual meeting of Baptist Missions Society: "The motives to missions work can never be found in a command as such. We read the command of Jesus in the Gospel, 'Go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature,' and we know by experience that for the multitudes it does not constitute a motive at all. They are quite well aware of it, but they quite easily ignore it. It only acts as a motive in those who have themselves been won by Christ, who realise what an unspeakable gift God

has given us in his Son."

One domestic helper from the Indonesian Fellowship understood this motive. Ekawati accepted Christ as her personal Saviour and Lord during her stay in Singapore. She has just enrolled in YWAM's Discipleship Training School in Bali with the objective to bring the Gospel to her hometown. Indeed from Home Missions, God will bring forth more disciplermakers! Her actions inspired another domestic helper who will do likewise next year!

Pastor Siang Hon, by divine appointment, met a Bangladeshi migrant worker. God allowed them to relate well to each other despite some difficulties in communication. They communicate over WhatsApps and through this, Pastor Siang Hon got to meet the Bangladeshi worker's friends. The Gospel was shared in their conversations. So far there is no rejection on the part of the Bangladeshi worker. He is even open to read the Bible. We pray that one day, he too will accept Christ as his personal saviour and be a disciplermaker in Bangladesh.

Each one of us has a role in missions. Do pray and ask the Lord which of the four roles (Goer, Welcomer, Sender, Mobiliser) you can participate in.

Last Week's Sermon Summary

Running with the Gospel

SCRIPTURE: ACTS 8:26-40 • SERMON: REV COLIN SMITH

Introduction

Acts tells us the story of how the Gospel spread from Jerusalem through Judea to Samaria and to the ends of the earth (1:8). It also tells us how the Gospel came to Africa through the conversion of a man from Ethiopia.

God took the initiative by sending Philip to a desert place. Earlier, Philip had preached to crowds in the city (vv.5, 6). But his greatest work was his ministry to one man whom he met in a desert. Never underestimate what God can do when you are in a desert place.

God also took the initiative in the life of the Ethiopian. He was the Queen's treasurer, the chief financial officer of an entire nation. He had adopted Judaism and had come to Jerusalem to worship. In all likelihood, the visit did not go well. The man was a eunuch, and an ancient law given to Israel would have excluded him from the temple courts (Deut 23:1).

On the journey home, he was reading a copy of the prophecy of Isaiah, but he could not understand it. At that point God brought Philip across his path. God works by bringing people who know Him across the path of people who need to know Him.

Philip proclaimed the Gospel to the Ethiopian. He began with the Scripture that the man was reading from Isaiah 53 and told him the good news about Jesus. This meant telling the man who Jesus is, what He accomplished in His atoning death on the cross, how He rose from the grave, and is now gathering people from every tribe and nation for Himself, offering grace, mercy and new life to all who will come to Him in faith and repentance — including the eunuch (see Isa 56:3).

Philip must have also told him about baptism because when they reached an oasis in the desert, the man asked if he could be baptised. Baptism is more than a testimony in which we confess our faith to God and to others. It is a gift in which God speaks to us about the effects of the Gospel in our lives washing us clean, raising us from death to life, and bringing us to belong to the Father, the Son and the Spirit and hence to the family of God.

God still works in the same way today. Lives will be changed and communities will be reached as God takes the initiative and we proclaim the Gospel.
