

FOREWORD BY SENIOR PASTORS

PREPARING TO MEET KING JESUS

What do times of crisis and uncertainty compel us towards? They compel us to confront our own mortality, scrutinise our foundations and evaluate our purpose.

Most of all, they compel us to seek the face of God.

As we sought the Lord, He assured us through these verses:

"And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build My church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven."

In these uncertain times, we can be rested in Jesus because He has promised that He Himself will build His Church and the gates of hell shall not prevail.

The keys of the Kingdom of God

are the preaching of the Gospel of Jesus Christ – His incarnation, death, resurrection, ascension and second coming. And we are to proclaim it! As the Church, it is our responsibility and privilege to do so. When people believe the Good News, they are able to enter God's Kingdom.

We are reminded of the charge that the Apostle Paul gave to Timothy as the spiritual leader of the church at Ephesus:

"I charge you in the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and by His appearing and His kingdom: preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, and exhort, with complete patience and teaching. For the time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander off into myths."

– 2 Timothy 4:1-4 (ESV)

Hence, this year's spiritual burden is "Preparing to Meet King Jesus" — make ready God's Kingdom people to prepare the world to meet King Jesus in eternity. The world is in darkness and pain. The task is urgent. We believe that we are now in the final hour. We have to prepare ourselves and others to meet King Jesus. This is really what the Church is all about.

How can we prepare ourselves to meet King Jesus?

A People Prepared for His Coming: Be Watchful!

In Luke 1:17, John the Baptist's calling was to prepare the people for the first coming of our Lord. Like him, we are called to prepare the people for Christ's second coming. We are to be watchful and persevere in prayer, so as to be ready for the coming of the Lord.

A People Prepared to Stand Firm and Take Action: Be Fruitful!

In times of great distress, those who know their God will stand firm and take action (Dan 11:32). This pandemic is a time of harvest. Many people everywhere are looking for hope. So let us stand firm in our calling as a church

A People Prepared in Personal Holiness: Be Faithful!

1 Thessalonians 4:1-3 remind us to guard our hearts and be faithful, for our own personal sanctification and holiness. Let's be faithful in our personal integrity and walk with God, aligning our lives back to God in holiness and faithfulness.

PRAY FOR

THE NEXT GENERATION MISSIONS

"The world is on lockdown, but missions is not."

This was the 2020 Missions Week focus. With the COVID-19 pandemic, our short-term mission trips, including The Next Generation (TNG) ones, had to be put on hold as international borders were closed. But missions was not on lockdown. Our young people began taking the initiative to get connected with the friends they got to know in their previous mission trips through digital platforms. Online get-togethers and online youth conferences were organised. A prayer initiative was started. The youths were able to encourage their friends who were in countries where the COVID-19 situation was more devastating.

Here at home in Singapore, a group of youths rallied their peers and families in the church to get involved in a National Day Project Appreciation¹ through fundraising, baking cookies, making cards and packing care packs. Close to 2,000 care packs were given to migrant workers living in dormitories. Some of the youths even joined the volunteers to give out the care packs to the workers.

The heart for missions begins at a young age. Time and opportunities will cultivate and grow the passion for missions in the hearts of our next generation.

In the National Missions Study 2019² done by Singapore Centre for Global Missions (SCGM), the survey results on Singapore's missional force showed that we are facing an ageing missional force. Less than 3% of missionaries surveyed are below the age of 30 years old. There is therefore a need to mobilise and challenge TNG to answer the missional call to be part of the missional force in the missions field.

We thank God for a group of young people who responded to the missional call in the 2020 Missions Week. Some will have a longer journey. While others are more ready to give of their time to explore short-term missions attachment to ascertain their missions calling. We desire to see the next wave of missionaries rising up among TNG!

PRAY

- Give thanks for the young people who have taken the initiative to stay connected with their friends in our partner churches in the current challenging times. For the continual strengthening of such cross-cultural peer discipleship.
- 2. For God to cultivate the missional heart in our next generation where they learn to give, pray, bless and go.
- 3. For God to stir up the hearts of young people who have a passion for cross-cultural missions. That they will step out in faith and obedience to heed God's missional call to preach the Good News in a cross-cultural context, both overseas and in Singapore.
- 4. For God to raise up the next wave of missionaries among TNG.

1-2 Thessalonians Revisited: Entreating with Thanksgiving

SCRIPTURE 1 Thessalonians 5:17-18; 2 Thessalonians 2:16-17; 3:16

DEEPER REFLECTION

PAUL'S THANKSGIVING AND PETITION TO GOD ARE PROMINENT

in 1 to 2 Thessalonians – found at nine locations in the eight chapters.¹ Reflected from this are the **attitude**, the **aim** and the **anchor** in prayer.

Always thankful is one's **attitude**: "We ought always to give thanks to God for you" (1 Thess 1:2; 3:9; 2 Thess 1:3; 2:13). Out of this lifestyle, Paul teaches us, "In everything give thanks" (1 Thess 5:18). Another attitude is **praying earnestly**. Paul "pray[s] most earnestly night and day" that he might return to Thessalonica to further build up the Thessalonians' faith (1 Thess 3:10-11). But God did not answer his prayer until five years later (Acts 20:1-3).²

The **aim** is **transforming life**. The Thessalonians' lives were marked by their "labour in love" (1 Thess 1:3). But Paul exhorted them "to do this more and more" (1 Thess 4:9-10), and prayed that "the Lord make you increase and abound in love" (1 Thess 3:12-13). And God answered his prayer immediately: "your love is increasing" (2 Thess 1:3).

The **anchor** is in **knowing God**. Paul anchors his prayer in who God is, especially Christ and God the Father "who loved us" (2 Thess 2:13, 16-17; 3:5; cf. 1 Thess 1:4). He prays that "the Lord direct your hearts... to the steadfastness of Christ" to establish further the Thessalonians' "steadfastness and faith" in enduring afflictions (2 Thess 1:4; 3:5). And he anchors in "the God of peace" (1 Thess 5:23; 2 Thess 3:16) and the God who is "faithful" (1 Thess 5:24; 2 Thess 3:3). In knowing God, we pray and through prayer we know God better.

1-2 Thessalonians Revisited: Enlarging the Borders

SCRIPTURE 1 Thessalonians 1:2-10

OBSERVATION How does the passage show the enlarging of borders in Paul's ministry of the Gospel?
APPLICATION How would I like to see my life and ministry being enlarged?
PRAYER Write a prayer to God as your response from your meditation on and application of the Scriptures.

DEEPER REFLECTION

PAUL CAME TO THESSALONICA TO EVANGELISE THE CITY.

Then he **established** the new believers into and as a "church" (1 Thess 1:1), constituting of former idol-worshipers (v.9), "devout Greeks" and "leading women" (Acts 17:4). And from here was the **enlarging** of the borders of Paul's ministry of the Gospel – into Macedonia and Achaia (v.7) and "everywhere" (v.8).

In this enlarging is the enlarging of the **Word of God**. "Our gospel came to you" (v.5) was enlarged to "the word of the Lord has sounded forth from you" (v.8). We must pass on the Word of God that we are growing in to establish other believers and evangelise the unsaved. There is the enlarging of the **walk with God**. Having observed "what kind of men" Paul and his co-workers "proved to be among you" (v.5b), the Thessalonians "became imitators" of them (v.6), and in turn "became an example to all the believers in Macedonia and in Achaia" (v.7) and their "faith has gone forth everywhere" (v.8). This enlarging of borders is fundamentally and ultimately the **work of God**. It is the powerful activity of the Holy Spirit through people "with full conviction" in their belief and walk with God (v.5). This enlarging movement took place in a particular life situation: "in much affliction" – but "with the joy of the Holy Spirit" (v.6). This is a **way of God** in His sovereign freedom and wisdom.

We can echo Jabez's prayer in this way: "Oh that You would bless me and enlarge the border of my life and ministry!" (1 Chron 4:10).

DEEPER REFLECTION

IN OUR SALVATION IN CHRIST, GOD CALLS US TO HIS GLORY:

"God, who **calls** you into His kingdom and **glory**" (1 Thess 2:12), and "He **called** you through our gospel, so that you may obtain the **glory** of our Lord Jesus Christ" (2 Thess 2:14). 1 to 2 Thessalonians shows us four dimensions of the glory of God that He calls us to.

The glory of God that **we receive from God**: "that you may **obtain** the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ" (2 Thess 2:14). The glory of God that **God reveals in us**: "when He comes on that day to be glorified **in His saints**" (2 Thess 1:10), and "the name of our Lord Jesus may be glorified **in you**" (2 Thess 1:12). It is noteworthy that these two dimensions of the glory of God follow the relationship between Jesus and His Father: "Now is the Son of Man glorified, and **God is glorified in Him**; if God is glorified in Him, God will also **glorify Him in Himself**, and will glorify Him immediately" (Jn 13:31-32).

The glory of God is **God reigning over us**. Clearly God's "kingdom and glory" that He calls us to are interrelated (1 Thess 2:12). Being in God's kingdom is being under God's kingship. The glory of God is **God residing with us**. The "presence of the Lord" that we will be in at Christ's Second Coming is also "the glory of His might" (2 Thess 1:9).

Recognise that this glory of God in our present journey and as our future destiny in Christ is **God's "grace"** (2 Thess 1:12).

DEEPER REFLECTION

THIS WEEK, WE WILL JOURNEY TOGETHER WITH A

Devotional Journal series leading up to Sunday's sermon entitled "the Christmas that changed the world". Let's begin with this question: has Christmas changed *your* world? If Christmas is just an annual event to you, the answer is probably "no". We feel good when Christmas comes every year, enjoy the parties and presents...and then it goes by and life goes on. We turn our attention to the worries of the year ahead.

But if Christmas is not just an event, but a celebration of Christ, then your answer changes drastically! Who is this Christ? Not merely the cute baby in the manger, but the awesome Cosmic Creator - the Word at the beginning! To the Jewish reader, verse 1 immediately brings to mind the first words in Genesis.³ The Jews referred to the books of the Bible by their opening words, and "in the beginning" was the Jewish name for Genesis.

The baby in the manger was not made – but rather the Maker of all things (v.3). That Christ is described as the Word points to how God powerfully created the world and everything in it – just by speaking it all into being (see Gen 1:3)! This Advent season, as we prepare our hearts to celebrate Christmas and point others to Christ, let us begin by worshipping the glorious Creator who continually sustains all that He has made. Pause and give thanks today, for everything good, delightful and needful in our lives comes from Him.

DEEPER REFLECTION

CHRISTMAS IS, IN SOME WAYS, A FESTIVAL OF LIGHTS.

Just look at the fabulous Orchard Road Christmas light-up or the fairy lights on our Christmas trees. Pretty lights cheer us up!

Light isn't just **beautiful**, however, it is absolutely **needful**. Without sunlight, plants and other photosynthetic organisms would not be able to convert solar energy into the chemical energy needed to sustain life in every cell. No light, no life.

There is also a **spiritual** connection between light and life. John the Evangelist writes: "In Him was life, and the life was the light of men" (v.4). God alone has life in Himself (Jn 5:26). This life is light to us because it is His **revelation**. Just as light is needed to illuminate our path on a dark night, we need the light of God's salvation when we are trapped in sin's darkness.

And here's the good news. The moral and spiritual darkness we see in the world and in our own hearts has not defeated the light (v.5)! No matter how overwhelming the darkness might feel to us, the truth is that it is no match for the true light. This is because darkness is simply the absence of light – it flees when light comes! No matter how resistant our friends or family members might be to the light of Christ, we can continue to intercede with hope. And in dark and troubling situations, we can sing with the hymnwriter Maltbie Babcock:

This is my Father's world:
O let me ne'er forget
That though the wrong seems oft so strong,
God is the Ruler yet.

WED

The Witness of Christmas

DEEPER REFLECTION

THE FIRST FIVE VERSES OF JOHN'S GOSPEL ARE A HYMN OF praise to the eternal Word. John the Evangelist interrupts this heavenly hymn to introduce another John - John the Baptist.⁴

John the Baptist, the forerunner to Jesus, was **sent from God** (v.6), commissioned to a specific task. In this respect, he is like the Lord Jesus himself, also sent by God the Father (Jn 3:17). What was John's task? To bear **witness** (or testify) to God's light (v.7). The word "witness" is a term from the law-courts⁵: John the Baptist is pictured here as a witness in the stands. He provides evidence according to what he knows and has experienced. John the Baptist was not the light, but only a witness to it.

Like John the Baptist, we too are sent by God – to our families and places of work. The Greek verb apostello, which means "sent", is where we get the English word "apostle" from. In a sense, we are all God's apostles, those He sends! Like John the Baptist, we are sent to testify to the light of God, so that others might come to believe in the Lord (v.7). We testify through our words and deeds. Take heart - we don't have to be **perfect** in order to be witnesses for Christ. God can use us, even with our fears and failures, for He is the light. Not us.

DEEPER REFLECTION

IF YOU WATCH ENOUGH AMERICAN TELEVISION, YOU WOULD

be familiar with the stereotypical scene where a child excitedly rips open a Christmas present only to find out that it is (another) ugly knitted sweater. The child's face falls in disappointment and he mumbles an insincere "thank you". The gift is completely not what he had hoped for!

Christ's gift of life and light can also appear to some as a present that they never asked for or wanted. We should not be surprised when people reject the Lord – because the Bible plainly states that this **will** happen! This rejection is ironic for two reasons, according to John. First, although humankind is **created** by God, we fail to recognise the **Creator** (v.10). Second, although humankind **belongs** to God, God Himself finds no **belonging** with us (v.11). Instead of receiving Him, we reject Him!

In our postmodern age, the rejection of God may not be an outright attack on Christianity. It is more likely to be a dismissive reduction of faith to a matter of personal preference – something along the lines of "good for you if Christianity floats your boat, but it's just not my thing".

What then is our Christian response? We must not lose hope in sharing the Gospel, even if rejection is likely. This is because John reminds us, that if people \bf{do} believe, He gives them the right – the amazing privilege – to become children of God (v.12)! What a privilege it would also be for us, as God's children, to welcome someone else into the family of God and see that person experience God's life and light!

DEEPER REFLECTION

THOUGH WE MAY NOT ADMIT IT, WE CHRISTIANS MAY BE tempted to think that the Christmas message is somewhat boring. Baby in a manger? Shepherds and angels? Yeah, we've heard the story a million times.

But when we pause to meditate on verse 14, we will find that the "overfamiliar" Christmas story is full of mystery and wonder. For John tells us that "the Word became flesh". This is the mystery of the incarnation (this word literally means the "in-fleshing"). The God who is infinitely wise and powerful humbled Himself and He clothed Himself in our frail and finite flesh. The eternal God subjected Himself to the limitations of time. How that happened is beyond us!

John also talks about the mystery of **Immanuel** ("God with us"), for he writes that "the Word became flesh and dwelt among us". The Greek verb skēnoō literally means that the Word lived in his tent amongst us.⁶ This evokes the image of God dwelling with the Israelites, through the Tabernacle, as they wandered in the desert. Wow! Why should the high and holy God of Heaven choose to live among us and enter our dirt? Being close to God is a privilege we can neither earn nor fully comprehend.

The mysteries of the incarnation and Immanuel are not abstract theological concepts, but have immense implications for us today. We can live incarnationally by identifying with others, **blessing** them in Christ and simply **being with** them, just as Christ came to be with us.

family, saying grace before the meal. This thanksgiving prayer is called "grace" because it acknowledges that "all that we need and cherish, comes from the Lord in token of His love". Every blessing - the gifts of family, fellowship, food and fun – is a gift of grace!

In meritocratic Singapore, many people find it hard to accept grace. We have a deep cultural belief that everything that we have is earned solely through our own merit and effort. Often, we are blind to how much in our lives is truly a result of grace. Verse 16 gives us a reality check, for it reminds us that "from His fullness we have all received, grace upon grace".

Jesus Himself is the ultimate gift of grace, because the unseen Father has been made known to us (exēgēsato) by Jesus (v.18)! From the Greek verb *exēgēsato* we derive the English word "exegesis": we could say that Jesus exegetes God to us. 8 To put it simply, Jesus tells us what the Father is really like.

God's gracious gift of Jesus the Son makes that first Christmas worldchanging. This Christmas, you can be part of God's work to change someone else's world. Will you tell someone, through your words and deeds, what God the Father is really like?

DEEPER REFLECTION

COVENANT EFC HAS ADOPTED A MODEL OF RELATIONAL

evangelism called B.L.E.S.S. – Begin in Prayer, Listen, Eat with a friend, Serve a friend and Share your story. This week, our devotions will focus on these five components. In Covenant EFC we believe wholeheartedly in relational evangelism, because the Gospel is about God drawing us into relationship with Himself and with one another! Sharing the Gospel is not just about persuading someone else to agree cognitively with some Christian doctrinal statements.

When we do any Gospel work, we must begin in prayer. This is because the Gospel goes forth by God's initiative and through God's power. Paul instructs the Church in Colossae to pray for the evangelists, that God may open to them "a door for the word, to declare the mystery of Christ" (v.3). Let us pray that the hearts of our pre-believing family, friends, colleagues and neighbours will be an open door that the Gospel can enter. Many of them may in fact be hardened to Christ because they are steeped in worldviews that reject God of the Bible – secular humanism, scientific materialism, postmodernism or other religious worldviews. These worldviews include many assumptions about life that are difficult to let go of. Therefore, it is only by God's gracious power that hearts are softened to the Gospel message.

As Paul exhorts, let's also be **steadfast** in prayer (v.2), not giving up easily even when the prayers seem to have no impact. We can pray with **thanksgiving** because we trust in a good God who is always working out His good purposes!

DEEPER REFLECTION

IN HIS 1937 CLASSIC, "HOW TO WIN FRIENDS AND INFLUENCE

People", Dale Carnegie gave this advice: "you can make more friends in two months by becoming genuinely interested in other people than you can in two years by trying to get other people interested in you." Listening attentively and sincerely is essential to relationship-building. In our digital age, many of us have lost the art of listening, for we are glued to our devices and drowned in a world of over-stimulation.

The Apostle Paul spent time with the Athenians, to know them and their way of life, before presenting the Gospel to them. He conversed with their philosophers and listened to their views (vv.17-18). He studied and understood their religious practices (v.23). And he found a bridge into their culture, a way to connect with the questions that they were concerned about (v.23)! The bridge was the inscription **to the unknown god**, which Paul used to proclaim to the Athenians the God that they had never known.

Listening to and understanding someone else will always require an investment of time and energy. But this is a worthy investment, because the act of listening conveys respect and love. Listening shows that we are willing to take the other person seriously and are genuinely interested in them as **people**. When we listen to others for the sake of the Gospel, they start to learn that **God** is genuinely interested in their lives, before we even say a word.

DEEPER REFLECTION

WRITING A DEVOTIONAL ENTRY THAT ENCOURAGES

Singaporeans to eat feels like an unnecessary exercise. After all, many Singaporeans live to eat! We discuss our dinner menu before we finish lunch. Eating has more than a material significance, however; it also has a social significance. In all societies of the world, ancient and modern, eating is a primary way of entering into and sustaining relationships. In fact, the English word "companion" is derived from the French and Latin words meaning "one who eats bread with another".

Verse 30 tells us that Jesus joined a lavish dinner banquet thrown by Levi the tax collector. The few verses before this provide the context of this feast – Jesus had called Levi the tax collector and Levi left his lucrative profession to follow Jesus (vv.27-28). In that society, tax collectors were heartily disliked: they were seen as collaborators with the Roman authorities and as extortioners. The Talmud classified them as robbers!

So why was Jesus at the banquet? Not to dine on wagyu and lobster, but to enter into fellowship with those despised in Jewish society. His motivation was compassion: to call sinners to repentance (v.32). He saw beyond their social stigma to their deep spiritual need. Will we follow in the footsteps of our Lord and become a compassionate companion of someone who needs the Saviour?

DEEPER REFLECTION

THE PHRASE "SERVANT LEADERSHIP" WAS COINED BY

Robert K. Greenleaf in 1970.¹² Greenleaf's model of servant leadership may be applied to secular contexts today, but its roots are found in the life and teaching of Christ, who came not to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many (v.45).

Jesus seized a teachable moment to instruct his disciples about servant leadership. James and John, members of Jesus's inner circle, had come to him with an audacious request: to be honoured with thrones to the right and left of Jesus when Jesus ushered in the Kingdom of God and was crowned as King (v.37). They were happy to exalt Jesus, as long as they were exalted too! Jesus responded to his disciples' worldly request by first **rejecting** the world's system of greatness: "but it shall not be so among you!" (v.43a) Next, he **redefined** being great as becoming a servant, or worse, a slave (v.43b-44). In the Roman Empire, slaves had the lowest status and no rights at all – and seemed like the antithesis of greatness!

Jesus's teaching on being a servant is profound and profoundly difficult to live out. Yet, if He has commanded it, He will empower us to serve others as He has served us. Will we obey and find practical ways to serve someone today? Not just someone we like and love, but the last, least and the lost? May we thereby point them to the Servant King!

IT IS USEFUL FOR EVERY DISCIPLE OF CHRIST TO WRITE

down a one- to two-page personal testimony that details what our lives were like before Christ, how we came to know Christ and what changed as a result of knowing Christ. There are two reasons for this.

First, this personal testimony helps us remember. In the hustle and bustle of life, we often get bogged down by so many burdens that we forget the central story of our lives: how we were saved by the Lord and are continually being sanctified. Returning to God's story in our lives helps us to renew our perspective, especially when we go through trying and painful seasons.

Second, this personal testimony may help someone else to encounter Christ. Your personal experience with Christ is irrefutable – it is **your** story. No one can say it didn't happen or isn't true. Your story may give hope to a pre-believing and help that person understand more concretely the difference that Christ makes. The Samaritan woman, having encountered the Lord, went back to her town and told the townspeople – "come, see a man who told me all I ever did." (v.29). She couldn't keep her life-changing experience of Jesus to herself. And her story went viral! The townspeople left the town and came to Jesus (v.30) and believed in Jesus because of the woman's testimony (v.39). Furthermore, her testimony led many of them to hear the word of the Lord for themselves and therefore believe (vv.41-42). Do not underestimate how God can work through your testimony!

B.L.E.S.S. and Bless the Lord Because You Have Been Blessed

SCRIPTURE Ephesians 1:3-14

strategy or tool, to become a mere church programme. We sometimes end up doing B.L.E.S.S. out of a spirit of **compulsion**: because our leaders nag us to. Or worse, we may end up doing B.L.E.S.S. out of a spirit of **competition**: we think we can earn brownie points before God and pat ourselves on the back because we are more diligent in evangelising than "that Christian brother or sister over there". We forget that salvation is from first to last a gift from the Lord and not a work of man.

The antidote to compulsion and competition is to return frequently to the glorious truth that we ourselves have been BLESSED by God in Christ (v.3). This is not a banal or basic truth; we can spend the rest of our lives – and eternity – discovering its depths. The blessings are abundant! God chose us in Christ before the foundation of the world to be holy and blameless before Him (v.4). That means you and I were chosen, before we had any conscious existence (and way before we could respond to Him) to be God's own special possession! Also, in Christ we have redemption through His blood and the forgiveness of our trespasses (v.7). What a wonder it is to remember that God has forgiven us, and continues to forgive us, though we fail again and again. The only rational response to God's blessing is to join the Psalmist in exuberant praise: bless the Lord, O my soul, and all that is within me, bless his holy name! (Psa 103:1)

LUKE IS A HISTORIAN. LUKE'S CONTRIBUTION CAME AFTER

diligent research. His sources were eyewitnesses with first-hand knowledge of Jesus' life and ministry. Luke's Gospel was historically grounded, accurate and purposeful. If not for Luke, we'll not have the Christmas story of Jesus' birth¹³. If not for Luke, we'll not have some of the stories that augment the Christmas story, and for that matter, the beginning and growth of the early church in Acts.14 Luke was also a theologian. He wanted to teach the recipients of his Gospel about God and the ways of God through Christ. He was interested in confirming Theophilus in his faith.

Luke can be said to use history to inform his theology. There are distinct emphases: the themes of prayer, salvation and God's special interest in the marginalised people in first-century Jewish Palestine (e.g., the sick, tax-collectors, women and children). Luke also emphasises the work of the Holy Spirit more than the other Synoptic Gospel writers. This has two important applicational implications: (1) We can trust the Bible as historically reliable; and (2) We can share our story. Luke has a story of Jesus and the church (in Acts). If there's a central theme in Luke-Acts, it might be "salvation". Luke-Acts is the story of the "Saviour" (Lk 1:69; 2:11; Acts 5:31; 13:23), the story of those who are being saved (e.g., Lk 19:1-10; Acts 2:47), and traces how salvation extends from Israel to the ends of the earth (Lk 1:77; 2:30; Acts 1:8; 13:47). What's your story? Are you purposefully sharing your redemptive story and how it weaves into the story of Jesus this Christmas?

THE ANNOUNCEMENT OF JOHN THE BAPTIST'S BIRTH IS

part of God's grand plan for Israel and signals the renewed activity of God to his people promised in the Old Testament. This concerns the promised coming of Jesus (2 Sam 7:12-13, 16), the One John will precede as forerunner (vv.16-17, 76; cf. Mal 4:5-6). Although God is concerned about fulfilling his promises to Israel (at the national level), he is also meeting the personal needs of a righteous couple in Zechariah and Elizabeth (at a personal level).

In the birth narratives, Luke introduces the parents of John the Baptist as pious, law-abiding Jews faithfully serving as priests despite Elizabeth's barrenness. Zechariah is at the high point of his priestly career when chosen by lot to offer incense in the holy place of the temple. As he does so, the angel Gabriel appears and announces the promise of a son to him and his wife in their advanced years; this child is to be called John, who will turn many in Israel back to the Lord and "make ready" a people prepared for the Lord (vv.16-17). Although Zechariah had been praying for a child for many years (v.13), he was unable to immediately believe that his prayers had been answered (v.20). The fulfilment of God's plan is not contingent on Zechariah's ability to trust God for what he prayed for. Zechariah's prayer had evidently made a difference as God had heard his prayers (v.13). This is the mystery and invitation of prayer: we persevere in prayer (human responsibility) and God will always still accomplish his good purpose in our lives (divine sovereignty).

THE ANGEL GABRIEL SIMILARLY APPEARED TO MARY, A

young maiden betrothed to be married. His announcement must have been disturbing, as she was told that she'll be pregnant with child when she had not known any man. Besides, this was no ordinary child. He will be "great" and "called the Son of the Most High (God)" (v.32). And the Lord God will give to him the "throne of his father David...and his kingdom there will be no end" (v.33).

It's usually easier to submit to God's will when you understand what it entails; but it's less easy to do so when the journey ahead is less clear. What will her betrothed think when he finds out that she is pregnant with child (though not his)? Will she forfeit her marriage and be ostracised by her community? As Christians, we're sometimes challenged to follow the Lord's will when personal sacrifices are called upon and obedience to the Lord may bring hardships and fears, whether real or imagined. In such times, truly knowing who God is and putting our faith in His goodness and grace will help us submit to Him (cf. vv.46-55). Also, God often uses significant people to encourage us: like an Elizabeth who is ahead of Mary in her lived experience. When Mary came to her, Elizabeth was "filled with the Holy Spirit" and remarked to Mary that she will be "blessed" when she "believed" that the Lord would fulfil His word to her (v.45). That's why we all need a community like a CG and godly mentors who can share how they've navigated life's challenges as Christians.

DEEPER REFLECTION

THE PARALLEL ACCOUNTS OF JOHN (THE BAPTIST) AND Jesus follow the prologue: the **prophecy** of the birth of John is followed by the **prophecy** of Jesus' birth; the birth of John (vv.57-66) has a parallel in the birth of Jesus (Lk 2:1-21); Mary's Song – the Magnificat ("glorifies") – is paralleled in Zechariah's Song – the Benedictus ("praise be"). Why the precedence of John the Baptist over Jesus in their birth accounts? If the Gospels are essentially a record of Jesus' life and ministry, why did Luke start his birth narratives with the prophecy of the birth of John the Baptist?

Perhaps one explanation is this: John the Baptist is intentionally depicted as the one who has come to fulfil his role as the **forerunner** of Jesus the Christ, as promised in Scripture (Lk 1:17, 76; cf. Matt 3:1-3). This is certainly plausible in view of Luke's description of how he carefully researched and thoughtfully recorded eyewitness testimonies (the text reads "carefully and methodically write" in the original Greek language); cf. Luke 1:1-4. If correct, this has several implications: (1) John the Baptist's precursory role was clearly articulated in God's plan; (2) John fulfilled his given role without comparison nor complaint (see Matt 3:11-12; Jn 3:30); and (3) John came to reconcile fathers to children, make wise the disobedient and to "make ready for the Lord a people prepared". Do we know and are actively and joyfully fulfilling our God-given roles in the Kingdom of God? Are we readying ourselves and others to meet King Jesus? It may simply be sharing our story this Christmas. Let's be ready!

LUKE'S INFANCY NARRATIVE FOCUSES ON THE INTERTWINING

destinies of Jesus and John the Baptist. The stories of their births are extended into three hymns of praise in Mary's "Magnificat", Zechariah's "Benedictus" and Simeon's "Nunc Dimittis". These songs focus on the hope of Israel's restoration, the joy of eschatological salvation and identification of Jesus as the promised Davidic Messianic-Saviour. Mary's song is a hymn of praise and thanksgiving, an expression of trust in God. These three songs in Luke's infancy narratives are full of theology, instructing us on the nature of God and what he has done (e.g., God is Saviour, compassionate, mighty and holy).

What about us? Do we have songs that are theologically rich and shape the fabric of our devotional life? Do we have songs that inform us about God's character and serve to anchor our lives in good times and in challenging times? Reverend Dr David Wong, veteran pastor and respected author and leader in church circles in Singapore, recently shared with a group of pastors that he has a song each year to anchor his life and ministry. This is a wonderful practice as it serves as a compass for God's guidance and provides comfort and encouragement in times when God's grace is needed the most. What about you? Do you have some special Scripture or a song or two that mark your life as milestones of God's grace and goodness? Begin to ask God for these Scriptural texts (that we can memorise) and songs (that we may regularly sing) to mark your life.

The Christ of Christmas Is for Everyone

DEEPER REFLECTION

CHRISTMAS IS MEANT TO BE A JOYOUS TIME OF THE YEAR.

But it is also a most difficult time of the year for many people: the destitute, the sick, the prisoners and foreigners who are unable to return home to be with loved ones. In verses 1 to 21, we read about the angelic hosts appearing in glory and proclaiming the Good News of the Saviour's birth to lowly shepherds.¹⁷ They were told that the birth of the Christchild had taken place, but not in a palace or amidst pomp and pageantry. The shepherds immediately and hastily left to witness the nativity scene in Bethlehem for themselves.

The simplicity of the scene of "a baby wrapped in swaddling clothes lying in a manger" was remarkably inviting for these shepherds, if nothing else for its ordinariness. Yes, the story behind Christmas is **remarkable** though a **simple** one. It is **remarkable** because God chose to become a human being and came as a humble infant to an ordinary Jewish family. Perhaps the majestic hymn of praise by the heavenly hosts to signal the coming of this Christ-Child (vv.13-14) is this: to underscore that this infant Jesus is no less divine even though he chose to be "born in the likeness of a human" (Phil 2:5-11; cf. Col 1:15-20). The Christmas story is also a **simple** one: on Christmas day "is born in the city of David a Saviour, who is Christ the Lord" (v.11). Let's take every opportunity to share the joy of this "good news" with everyone, especially with those who are often overlooked in our midst. Be blessed this Christmas!

use your imagination to trace the actions. The woman **took** some of the fruit from the tree that God had forbidden and **ate** it. She also *gave* some to her husband and he **ate** it. Each one of these actions portrays human hands exalted up against the will of God, thus incurring the wrath of God, in whose hands are the cup of judgment (v.8).

This cup of judgment is still being poured out against sin today. In Hebrew, the second half of Jeremiah 15:6 says literally to God's disobedient covenantal people, "**My hand is stretched out** against you and I will ruin you." Our God does not condone sin, for sin ruins His good creation and purposes. He must act against sin.

Amazingly, God's action against sin leads Him to take upon Himself the burden of sin. In a passage that reminds us of Genesis 3:6, Paul in Philippians 2:6 describes Jesus the Messiah as not considering equality with God something to be **grasped** or **taken**. He has done it for us, and died on the cross to resolve the problem of sin. God struck Himself with His powerful hand against sin, for the judgment and salvation of the world.

the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt. In the broader picture, God was calling out a people that they may worship Him and follow His ways. This is the meaning of being in a covenant – bringing what was once non-family to become family. Isn't it incredible that our God yearns to bring us into a covenant with Himself?

Creation once began in covenant with God, but because of humanity's rebellion, fell out of that covenant and was separated from God. Yet, through the Biblical story, God repeatedly initiates covenants – with Noah and all creation, with Abraham, with Moses and the Israelites and with David – all as part of a grand plan to reconcile all things to Himself. This plan finally leads to the New Covenant, where salvation is extended to all, whether Jew of Gentile, slave or free, male or female (Gal 3:28).

So together we sing with Moses and the Israelites, "The LORD is my strength and my defense; He has become my salvation. He is my God, I will praise Him, my father's God, and I will exalt Him (v.2)."

I LOVE THE PICTURE OF THOMAS PUTTING HIS FINGER

into the nail-holes in Jesus' hands. John has set up from the beginning of his Gospel account that Jesus is none other than YHWH God-in-the-flesh (e.g., Jn 1:1,18). John's readers thus must interpret Jesus no less than God throughout the 21 chapters. Here, it is the God of the universe standing before a man, offering His hands to be inspected by a man. The same hands of God hung from the cross, nailed there by the hands of man.

What glorious mystery! The world created and sustained by God's hands for His purpose is now once more committed into God's hands for its redemption. And our God in humility offers his hands to us and says "come, take a look." There is only one pair of hands worthy to hold the universe together and He has done it.

There is additional mystery. The man hanging from the cross cries out to God in Luke 23:46, quoting Psalm 31:5 – "Father, into Your hands I commit my Spirit." Unspoken is the second half of Psalm 31:5 – "Deliver me, LORD, my **faithful** God." Because of the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross, who was **not** delivered from death for our sakes, today we can say together with the Psalmist, "I trust in You, LORD; I say, 'You are my God.' My times are in Your hand (Psa 31:14-15)."

FRI

The Hand of God Through the Church

SCRIPTURE Acts 4:27-31; 5:12-14; 11:19-21

OBSERVATION What do you see the hand of God doing through the church in these passages	s?
APPLICATION How might God want you to participate in building His church and proclaiming the Gospel in the coming year?	
PRAYER Write a prayer to God as your response from your meditation on and application of the Scriptures.

DEEPER REFLECTION

IN GREEK, ACTS 5:12 BEGINS WITH "THROUGH THE HANDS OF

the apostles, many signs and wonders were performed...". Consider how this parallels and yet differs from verse 30, where the believers pray for the hand of God to be stretched out to perform healing and signs and wonders through the name of God's holy servant Jesus. The implication should be obvious – Jesus' ministry is now continued through the church, that is, you and me.

Acts 11:21 gives us a little bit more insight. The Gospel has spread to Antioch as the disciples were scattered due to persecution and the church was growing there. The reason given by Luke (who wrote Acts) is simply: "The Lord's hand was with them." God's kingdom work is not finished on the cross. It continues in the life of the Church, which is the body of Christ. We are the hands and feet and mouths that Jesus has entrusted to continue His work until He comes again.

Yet we do not do it in our own strength, but by the strength of God's own hand. The same hands that shaped creation, are stretched out against sin, extended to us in covenant, nailed to the cross for redemption and is now upon believers in Jesus Christ, so that God's purposes continue to march forward. What a privilege, what a task. Lord, have mercy on us!

SAT

The Hand of God in Fulfilling God's Purposes

SCRIPTURE Revelation 5:1-10; 21:1-8

OBSERVATION Use a little imagination once more – where do you see the hand of God in verses 1 to 10?
APPLICATION What feelings does Revelation 21:1-8 evoke within you as you meditate on it and why?
PRAYER Write a prayer to God as your response from your meditation on and application of the Scriptures.

Prayer Pointers

- ♦ Give thanks and praise
- Pray for Church Board: To have godly wisdom to lead Covenant EFC well in navigating changing circumstances and cultures as we enter into another year, faithfully committing the future into God's hands
- ♦ Pray for significant people
- ♦ Pray for those in need

DEEPER REFLECTION

TYPICALLY, SCROLLS ARE NEITHER WRITTEN ON BOTH SIDES,

nor sealed with seven seals (although we do have one archaeological example of it). With these two descriptions, John the Seer immediately understands that the scroll contains heavenly business, held in the right hand of God, concerning God's purposes for all of creation. So John weeps when no one can open the scroll – it means that God's purposes cannot be fulfilled. Everything is futile.


However, someone steps up. The Lion of the tribe of Judah, the Root of David, who is also the slain Lamb. Jesus the Messiah is worthy! In another mysterious juxtaposition, the Son of God, who is Himself God, takes the scroll from the hand of God on the throne, while all creation and all peoples fall down in worship.

Revelation 6 to 19 tells of the events associated with the opening of the scroll, where we see judgment intermingled with salvation. God's people triumph by patient endurance and faithfulness (Rev 13:10), by the blood of the Lamb and the word of their testimony, not loving their lives even unto death (Rev 12:11). In doing so, they prove themselves true followers of the slain Lamb – a strange triumph.

Until in Revelation 21:1-8 we catch a glimpse of the glorious purposes written in the scroll – a new heaven and new earth. A new creation, the new Jerusalem, coming down to earth out of heaven. Like it was at the beginning in Eden, God once more fully dwells among His faithful people, while anything unholy is destroyed. God's purposes, fulfilled by the hand of God! "Amen, come Lord Jesus!" (Rev 22:20).
