preparing to meet king jesus: into your hands

Since 2021, our theological burden and impetus towards Vision 2028 &. Beyond is Preparing to Meet King Jesus. Every year, we also ask God to show us a specific spiritual emphasis that we must pay attention to as we continue in our mission. For this year, it is Preparing to Meet King Jesus: Into Your Hands. Hence, we will be studying the Old Testament book of Daniel this year.

The phrase "Into Your Hands" was inspired by Daniel 6:26-27, which reads: "I make a decree, that in all my royal dominion people are to tremble and fear before the God of Daniel, for he is the living God, enduring forever; his kingdom shall never be destroyed, and his dominion shall be to the end. He delivers and rescues; he works signs and wonders in heaven and on earth, he who has saved Daniel from the power of the lions."

As the lyrics of the song "Ancient of Days" by CityAlight declares, "Though the nations rage, kingdoms rise and fall, there is still one King, reigning over all. So I will not fear for this truth remains: That my God is the Ancient of Days." Indeed, just as every king and every kingdom are ultimately in the sovereign hands of God, we entrust ourselves into the hands of God.

As we entrust **ourselves**– every leader, child,
marriage, family and every
generation – into God's
Hands, let us also entrust **our mission** to make
disciples into His hands.

Salvation is no small thing. We have a mission to be witnesses and we must act with a sense of urgency. Will we be found sleeping on our watch? May we not forget our call and mission as the Church – to be witnesses for Christ.

May you entrust yourself into His sovereign hand daily as you prepare to meet King Jesus!

pray for South asia

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed."

LUKE 4:18 (ESV)

n times like this when we hear of wars and rumours of wars, floods and famines, persecutions and testing of our faith, we are sadly reminded of the inevitable – that such things must happen. But let us stand firm to the end, for the Lord has shown us what is good and what is required of us. As we humbly bring South Asia before Him, may we know this God who loves mercy and who will act justly over the nations.

Pray for:

1. Bangladesh:

- a. A land of 169 million people, about one-third of whom are youths and 13 million diasporas.
 - For God to bless this people group and their next generation, whether those who are residing in the country or working overseas.
- Less than 0.5% of the population are Christian, with many places without any churches or Christian witnesses, especially rural areas.

- For God to strengthen the Church in Bangladesh, enabling her members to be the salt and light wherever they are.
- c. Outreach in Bangladesh whether through charity organisations or missions is gradually helping to shape the future of the nation, especially its poor communities.
 - For God to continue to send labourers into His harvest field, to serve the poor and share the Good News with those who need hope.

2. Sri Lanka

- a. Economic mismanagement, coupled with the effects of COVID-19 have pushed Sri Lanka into a severe financial crisis. The International Monetary Fund's US\$3 billion bailout will not help immediately, especially when inflation is at 50%, income taxes are up 36% and power tariffs have risen 66%. Families are forced to reduce the food portions they feed their children and many are leaving the country out of sheer necessity.
 - i. For God-fearing, righteous and wise government, and for hope in God to dawn upon this nation.
- b. 7.4% of the population are Christians, mostly in Colombo and in the northwest.
 - For unity of the churches, regardless of denominations; for repentance and humility to work together that they may bring salvation to all the people of Sri Lanka in this time of crisis.

3. India

- a. India's political agenda: The government has made strong moves to push India out of secularism and promote the country as a Hindu nation. This is causing communal disturbances and riots in many places.
 - i. For political development towards increased religious freedom and peace in the land.

pray for south asia

- b. India's religious upheaval: We are seeing much turmoil and fear among the minority religions. There is active persecution, churches have been attacked and church members arrested after false accusations of conversion cases against them.
 - i. For the Christians to take courage in the Lord and be strengthened in their resolve to stand firm in the faith.
- c. India's youth concerns: 50% of the country's population is between the ages of 25 and 65. There is high unemployment and many are losing hope in life. Criminality, drug usage and suicides have seen a huge increase among the youth.
 - i. For the young people to find their identity, belonging and life purpose in Jesus Christ.

Paradigm for Theocentric Personal History

SCRIPTURE Daniel 5:18-21

OBSERVATION

What is the significance of Daniel interpreting the inscription on the wall for Belshazzar by starting with telling a story of his ancestor, Nebuchadnezzar?

aniel began his interpretation of the inscription on the wall for Belshazzar by telling a story of his ancestor, Nebuchadnezzar – a particularly significant episode in his life (vv.18-21). Daniel began with history. History is valuable for living life. This value of history is seen in three dimensions: past, present and future. We can glean insights from the past through knowledge, understanding and reflection to form perspectives for living in the present and gain wisdom for living in the future. One very important history is our personal history: the story of our life journey. But do we see significance in our personal history? What gives the significance is God and when God writes our personal history.

The significant episode in Nebuchadnezzar's life that Daniel pointed Belshazzar to forms a paradigm for understanding our personal history in two dimensions. **A journey that reveals who God is (vv.18-19):** God revealed Himself to Nebuchadnezzar as "the Most High God" who "granted sovereignty, grandeur, glory and majesty" to kings of the earth (v.18). God reveals Himself in our life experiences, as He did to Nebuchadnezzar, which will result in us knowing God personally. And as we grow and mature in our theological journey, people can see God in our lives. **A journey that reveals the ways of God (vv.20-21):** For Nebuchadnezzar, it was how God humbled him in his pride. God works in our lives with different strokes for different folks. We are to "recognise" (v.21) the ways of God in our discipleship journey. But our discipleship motto must be "Have Thine own way, Lord".



Careful Use of Words: Note the difference in approach and tone that Daniel used in talking to Nebuchadnezzar and Belshazzar over the same issue of pride. Daniel spoke to Nebuchadnezzar with "pastoral warmth, a reluctant but truthful interpretation of the dream" (Dan 4:19), and earnestly advised him to repent of his sins to avert God's judgment (Dan 4:27). But he confronted Belshazzar with "a more characteristically prophetic message, a direct word of outrage, divine justice and holiness to a man who was deliberately mocking God" (vv.22-23). In both cases, Daniel spoke with "an apt answer" and "a timely word" (Prov 15:23).

Grateful Use of Gifts: Belshazzar refused to acknowledge that his reign and everything that came with it were sovereign gifts from God. As a result, "those very gifts became his downfall". With the spiritual gifts endowed on them, the Corinthians regarded themselves as spiritually superior; and thinking that they were inherently gifted, they "boast as if you had not received it" from God (1 Cor 4:7).

Faithful Use of Truth: Belshazzar exalted himself against God, "even though you knew" the theological truth and historical fact of God's sovereignty in humbling the prideful Nebuchadnezzar (vv.22-23). God has given us His truth in Scripture, for we are to "live by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God" (Deut 8:3). Faithful use of truth means we diligently seek to know and understand God's Word rightly and consciously live by it.

Walking Humbly in God's Hand

SCRIPTURE Daniel 5:22-31

OBSERVATION

What significant observations can you make about God in this passage?

APPLICATION

What aspects of God do I need to align my life with?

deeper reflection

aniel's words to Belshazzar, "You have not humbled your heart... but you have exalted yourself" (vv.22-23a), point to a reality: We are either humble or proud. We cannot be not humble and not proud at the same time. Pride is not just self-exaltation, but self-exaltation "against the Lord of heaven", which also means we "have not glorified God" (v.23). God is always in the picture of humility and pride. Central in true humility is God being glorified. Three theological realities give us the impetus to walk humbly before God.

We cannot escape from God: "the God in whose hand are your lifebreath and all your ways" (v.23). We can commit our lives into God's hand and be secure that "My times are in Your hand" (Psa 31:5, 15a). But even when we choose not to entrust our lives into God's hand, we are in His hand regardless, for better or for worse before God. God examines our hearts: "you have been weighed and found deficient" (v.27). We are not to be proud or boastful, because God is "a God of knowledge, and with Him actions are weighed" (1 Sam 2:3). We need to come to a point where we can meekly say as Jeremiah, "You know me, O Lord; You see me; and You examine my heart toward You" (Jer 12:3). God can end anything anytime: "God has numbered your kingdom and put an end to it" (v.26). It is foolish to withhold anything from God, as if we can. God is God enough to take away anything from us as He pleases.

Say, "Before he knew Jesus, Saul disliked the Christians. He was nasty to them. But he transformed into a better man after he decided to follow Jesus. He became one of the apostles who

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Serving from Babylon to Persia

SCRIPTURE Daniel 5:17, 25-31; 6:1-2

OBSERVATION

What is the significance of Daniel serving in the Babylonian and Persian courts successively?

APPLICATION

How do I relate God's call for me in drastic changes of my life situations?

PRAYER

Lord, I believe You have a calling for my life which You have intended to be distinctive for me. I want to live my life with a deep sense of answering Your calling. Help me to walk with You faithfully, knowing that as I do so, You will unfold Your plans for me in that calling. Grant me wisdom and understanding to discern Your calling for my life.

od's word to Belshazzar that He would "put an end" to his kingdom and give it "over to the Medes and Persians" was fulfilled immediately – "that same night" (v.30) – after Daniel's interpretation of the inscription on the wall (vv.25-31). God can fulfil His Word immediately or after a long time. Whatever time God may take to fulfil His Word, He is "trustworthy in all His promises and faithful in all He does" (Psa 145:13b, NIV).

The demise of the Babylonian hegemony was not just a historical event, but primarily a theological one. Nebuchadnezzar was "My servant" whom God raised to judge His unfaithful people in the seventy-year Babylonian exile (Jer 25:8-9, 11). When God had accomplished His purpose through Babylon, "I will punish the king of Babylon and that nation" (Jer 25:12). This is how God deals with arrogant and evil nations: "And Babylon, the beauty of kingdoms, the glory of the Chaldeans' pride, will be as when God overthrew Sodom and Gomorrah" (Isa 13:19).

The end of Babylon does not mean an insecure future for Daniel. However drastically our circumstances may change, God's call for our lives remains when we walk with Him faithfully. We are secure in God's call, because it is **God's** call. Daniel became one of "the three commissioners" in Persia (Dan 6:1-2). It wasn't that having lost his job Daniel applied to serve the Persian king. Daniel couldn't do that. It was purely by royal appointment. But behind the "It seemed good to Darius to appoint" (Dan 6:1) was God's call for Daniel to serve Him from Babylon to Persia.



Discipleship in a Dog-Eat-Dog World

SCRIPTURE Daniel 6:1-9

OBSERVATION

What do Daniel and his fellow-commissioners and the satraps in the passage tell us about discipleship in the world?

APPLICATION

How do I face the discipleship challenges in living in this world?

PRAYER

prayer pointers

- Give thanks and praise

od has created humans to work, just as He worked in creating the universe (Gen 2:2-3, 5, 15). So, vocation has become a major aspect of our lives under the creation order. But we work in a fallen, highly competitive dog-eat-dog world, where people will do whatever it takes to be successful, even if that means harming others. We ought to, then, work in such a world consciously as faithful followers of Jesus. And Daniel is such a model.

Daniel's Competency: Daniel "possessed an extraordinary spirit" (v.3), which he already had while serving in the Babylonian court (Dan 5:12). The principle here is, God does give us certain gifts and abilities for competency in the vocation that He calls and directs us to. But Godgiven gifts and abilities do not rule out hard work. God does not intend the gifts and abilities to be always "extraordinary". For Daniel, the "extraordinary" was a divine necessity in his vocation. And because of his "extraordinary spirit", Daniel "began distinguishing himself" among his equals and his subordinates (v.3).

Daniel's Character: Daniel "was faithful, and no negligence or corruption was found in him" (v.4). We may not distinguish ourselves in terms of competency, but we must distinguish ourselves in character. Character is fundamental and is more important than competency. For one can be so competent as to make great and successful accomplishments, but corrupt in character. Such competency and accomplishments are "wood, hay, straw" in the light of ultimate reality (cf. 1 Cor 3:12-13). Daniel's character was formed through living by "the law of his God" (v.5).

Consistent Daily Devotion to God

SCRIPTURE Daniel 6:1-10

OBSERVATION

What does verse 10 tell us about Daniel?

APPLICATION

How can I cultivate a consistent daily devotion to God?

PRAYER

prayer pointers

- Give thanks and praise
- Pray for leaders

or Daniel's distinguishing competency and character, and commitment to ensuring that the king suffered no loss in his empire, Darius "planned to appoint" him "over the entire kingdom" (v.3). But out of jealousy, Daniel's fellow-commissioners and the satraps attempted to accuse him of "negligence or corruption" in "government affairs" (v.4a). They could find nothing, because Daniel was "faithful" (v.4b). So, they planned to make accusation against him "with regard to the law of his God" (v.5). And they maliciously instigated Darius to establish a law that "anyone who makes a petition to any god or man" besides the king "for thirty days, shall be cast into the lion's den" (vv.6-9).

Then, "when Daniel knew that the document was signed...he continued kneeling on his knees three times a day, praying and giving thanks before his God, as he had been doing previously" (v.10). This was Daniel's spiritual discipline with a structure of regular "three times a day". He kept it daily. We can say that Daniel never missed his quiet time. The most important words in the verse may be "when Daniel knew that the document was signed". They indicate the context of Daniel's spiritual discipline: A discipleship challenge where his life was at stake. Daniel's spiritual discipline was no mere religious ritual and routine. He could have skipped his quiet time "for thirty days" and be safe. He didn't. Daniel's spiritual discipline manifested his consistent daily devotion to "his God": "he continued...three times a day...as he had been doing previously." At the heart of this spiritual discipline was Daniel's relationship and fellowship with "his God".



Costly Daily Devotion to God

SCRIPTURE Daniel 6:1-17

OBSERVATION

What can you learn about the cost of discipleship from Daniel?

What is the cost of discipleship that I sense the Lord is calling me to pay in following Him?

hen the world seeks to falsely accuse faithful followers of Jesus of wrong, even when they are innocent, we should not be surprised that it succeeds. When the religious leaders brought false accusations against Jesus before Pilate, for three times Pilate's response was: "I have found no guilt in this man" (Lk 23:4, 14, 22). But Jesus was crucified, anyway. "A disciple is not above his teacher, nor a slave above his master," says the Lord Jesus (Matt 10:24).

Daniel's enemies succeeded in their false accusation against him through their malicious scheme (vv.4-13, 16-17). We may label Daniel's discipleship story in Daniel 6 as "Daniel's costly quiet time". We are not permitted to think of biblical discipleship without counting the cost of discipleship (Lk 14:28-29). It can be an ongoing cost that we are paying. Or a cost we are confronted with: Devotion to the Lord or den of the lions?

Consciously or unconsciously, our Christianity has been influenced and shaped, at both the church and individual levels, by Christianity in the West, which we often embrace uncritically. Hence, we may find that what commentator Iain Duguid says about Christianity in the West is also true of us: "...in the prosperous and supposedly tolerant West we have come to expect our lives as Christians to run smoothly and successfully, at least if we are faithfully following the Lord. We think that the slogan 'God loves you and has a wonderful plan for your life' means that our lives should be protected by God from any form of unpleasantness. This is a false belief, however." Is this true of you?

Walking Toward the Lions' Den

SCRIPTURE Daniel 6:10-17

OBSERVATION

What do you think Daniel might have been thinking and feeling as he was led to the lions' den?

APPLICATION

deeper reflection

t is one thing to be prepared to pay the cost of discipleship, but quite another to actually pay it, especially when the cost is very high. What was going through Daniel's mind and how was he feeling as he was being led to the lions' den?

Before Daniel was thrown into the lions' den, Darius said to him, "Your God whom you constantly serve will Himself deliver you" (v.16). Daniel's thought might be, "God is speaking to me through the king. I am very certain about it", or "Perhaps, God is speaking to me through the king. I am not sure". Surely, Daniel recalled God's miraculous deliverance of his three friends in Daniel 3. Would Daniel be expecting God to likewise deliver him? I believe Daniel held the same conviction as his three friends: God can and will deliver, but He may not deliver (Dan 3:17-18). Walking by faith is a certainty accompanied by "not knowing where he was going" (Heb 11:8).

I doubt that Daniel was cool and steady with an absence of any feeling of fear or anxiety. Jesus journeyed to the cross with "I have a baptism to undergo, and how distressed I am until it is accomplished" (Lk 12:50). This mysterious divine-human distress was real. But there was the peace of God in Jesus (cf. Isa 26:3). However, "Biblical peace is not often a general tranquility but rather a rightness at the centre in the midst of much turmoil." That "rightness at the centre" is the persevering steadfast faithfulness to the faithful God enabled by God's all-surpassing power (2 Cor 4:7).

deeper reflection

he Book of Hebrews teaches three kinds of faith, which can be encapsulated in Hebrews 11:35: exploits faith, endurance faith and eschatological faith. I have been a Christian for 50 years. The faith in my faith journey has been mainly endurance faith. And such is our present faith journey in having a special-needs son, whom we love, with the daily emotionally draining challenges that we face, and asking from time to time, "How long, O Lord?" (Psa 13:1). At times, I asked, "Lord, have I not endured enough?"

On my 66th birthday (14 March 2023), I had a prostate biopsy done. And on 30 March, I discovered that I have prostate cancer. I don't usually follow the Devotional Journal to read what I have written. But God directed me to read the entry of 30 March, entitled, "The Heat of Adversity Increases." It seems that what I have written, God has meant it for me. I think, it is God's answer to my question, "Lord, have I not endured enough?"

By Daniel 6, Daniel was a very old man, who was subjected to a severe test of his faithfulness to God (vv.3-17), more searching than the one he faced as a youth (Dan 1:8-16).7 "That Daniel faced this challenge to his faith in old age is a sobering lesson. There never comes a time in life when we can sit back and think that our faithfulness to God is so well established that it will never be challenged or tested again." "Yesterday's covenant loyalty was not enough. Today calls for a fresh choice."

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Trust Not in Powerful People

ing Darius occupies a prominent place in the story of Daniel being thrown into the lions' den for his faithfulness to God. Much was said about him. When he was forced to throw Daniel into the lions' den, because he had established and signed an edict which by "a law of the Medes and Persians" cannot be changed, he was "greatly distressed" (vv.14, 15, 17). He knew that his most trustworthy servant was innocent. So, he "set his mind to **deliver** Daniel" and he "kept asserting himself to **rescue** him" (v.14). But he could not. No matter how favourable Daniel was before Darius, this king just could not deliver him. This king was now powerless. But there is an intended contrast in Darius' powerlessness: God "will Himself deliver you" (v.16) and God is "able to deliver you from the lions" (v.20).

Through this helplessness of the most powerful person in the Persian Empire, the writer is "doing a little 'preventive theology" He seems to be saying to the people of God, "You may have rulers or others in high places who are well-disposed toward you; but don't rest in them as your trump card, for even they for all their apparent power can prove as helpless as Samson without hair [Judg 16:17]." When we put our trust in powerful people for security rather than God, we may make them into idols. The writer here "is trying to bash idols before they become idols" "Don't put your confidence in powerful people, there is no help for you there" (Psa 146:3, NLT).

Seeing Myself in Christian Service

SCRIPTURE Daniel 6:16-20

OBSERVATION

What do what Darius said to Daniel in verses 16 and 20 tell us about Daniel?

APPLICATION

deeper reflection

ow do we see ourselves in Christian service? This vision of oneself is important and it must be in our dominant consciousness, so that we will have clear thinking and strong conviction with regards to centrality, purpose, meaning, significance, impetus and pursuit in Christian ministry. Otherwise, Christian ministry becomes mere activism, or just going through the motion or serving by convenience, rather than by commitment. We ought to see ourselves in Christian service in two ways.

I see myself as serving God constantly: "your God whom you constantly serve" (vv.16, 20). The key word here is "constantly". Doubtless, this is what God requires of us. It means that the day I stop serving God is the day I die. It means I will not quit serving God. It means having put the hand to the plow, there is no "looking back" (Lk 9:62). The temptation to be like Demas is great. Demas was one of Paul's "fellow workers" in the Gospel among the likes of Mark and Luke (Philem 1:24). But years later, Demas left the team, "having loved this present world" (2 Tim 4:10-11).

I see myself as a servant of God: Daniel was a "servant of the living God" (v.20). Being a servant of God is fundamental and is foundational to serving God. We cannot serve God without first being a servant of God. We can be involved in Christian ministry without being a servant of God, because being involved in Christian ministry does not necessarily mean serving God. Jesus says, "If anyone **serves Me**, he must **follow Me**" (Jn 12:26).

Daniel Lived Out the Gospel

SCRIPTURE Daniel 6:3-5, 14-22

OBSERVATION

What do the acts and words of Daniel's enemies (vv.3-5) and King Darius (vv.14, 18-19) toward Daniel tell us about him?

APPLICATION

What do people see and say about my life?

PRAYER

prayer pointers

- Give thanks and praise
- Pray for leaders

- Pray for the Generations: That older believers will live out the Gospel and model it for young people
- Pray for self

deeper reflection

n Daniel 6, apart from his daily personal prayer (Dan 6:10), we know nothing about Daniel's personal or religious life. We don't know if he was involved in any kind of social or religious good causes, or if he went around evangelising the Babylonians. We see Daniel mainly in his daily secular work, serving a pagan government. But one thing is clear: Daniel lived out the Gospel.

People see Daniel's life. Daniel's enemies found him to be "faithful" and without "negligence or corruption" when they attempted to make accusations against him on government affairs (v.4). But a good testimony for God is not always attractive to pre-believers. The effect could be the opposite instead, as in Daniel's case (v.5). Darius' response to his casting Daniel into the lions' den by his mistake (vv.14-15, 18-19) shows how highly he valued Daniel for his commitment to the state's well-being. Perhaps, what Daniel could say about himself is of great significance: "I was found innocent before God" (v.22). Daniel walked with God in such a way that he could have such confidence about himself with humble honesty.

People see Daniel's God. For Darius, the God of Daniel was central in Daniel's crisis that he had caused: "Your God" (vv.16, 20). Darius saw Daniel's God in the latter's life, not just his integrity. We do not know how Darius saw God in Daniel's life. But we know he saw the reality of God in Daniel. It must be that this reality was manifested in how Daniel lived his life and did his work.

How Daniel Trusted in God

SCRIPTURE Daniel 6:16-23

hen Daniel was taken up out of the lions' den at Darius' orders, "no injury was found on him, because he had trusted in his God" (v.23). God delivered Daniel miraculously because Daniel trusted in Him. How did Daniel show his trust in God?

It is possible that God spoke to Daniel personally or through Darius (v.16), before he was led to the lions' den that He was going to deliver him, and he trusted in God to keep His word. It would be like Paul in Acts 27, when God spoke to him that he was safe in the dangerous storm-tossed sea voyage, that Paul could say, "I have faith in God that it will turn out exactly as I have been told" (Acts 27:23-25). But the text in Daniel 6 does not tell us anything like that.

Daniel's act of trusting in God is: "when Daniel knew that the document was signed", he continued his daily practice of praying to God (Dan 6:10). God's miraculous deliverance of Daniel in Daniel 6 corresponds to that of Daniel's three friends in Daniel 3. Daniel was like his three friends, "who put their trust in Him...and yielded up their bodies" (Dan 3:28). Yielding our lives to God, especially in difficult and uncertain times, is trusting in God. It is like the Psalmist: "I trust in You, O Lord...My times are in Your hands" (Psa 31:14-15a). And note the repeated "his God" and "your God" (Dan 6:5, 10, 11, 16, 20, 23), which point to Daniel's close relationship with God that is marked by mutual commitment.



Lord of the Lions' Mouths

SCRIPTURE Daniel 6:19-24

OBSERVATION

What significant observations can you make about God and the lions?

APPLICATION

How do I live in the "lions' den" of the world?

deeper reflection

hen you face the lions – literally or figuratively – do you see the lions or the Lord?

When Daniel was thrown into the lions' den, God "shut the lions' mouths" and the result was the lions "have not harmed me" (v.22). While Daniel was in the lions' den, he was actually in God's hands and so were the lions. The lions' mouths were shut toward Daniel, but not his malicious accusers when they were thrown to the same lions (v.24). Why? Because God is Lord of the lions' mouths.

However, this experience of Daniel is not a promise for all people at all times, that when we are in a lions' den, God will always "shut the lions' mouths" and it will always be "they have not harmed me". If the lions' mouths are not shut, does that mean that the lions are not in the hands of God? No. Whether the lions' mouths are shut or not, God is Lord of the lions' mouths.

There are God's people who "by faith" "shut the mouths of lions…escaped from the edge of the sword" (Heb 11:33-34). But there are "others" who are no less "by faith", are "put to death with the sword" (Heb 11:37). By the same faith, one escapes from "the sword" and another is killed by "the sword". We must be bifocal in faith: By faith, we escape from the sword, and by faith, we are killed by the sword. The object of faith is not faith itself. It is God, who is Lord of the sword, in whichever way we may experience the sword.

It's All About God's Glory

deeper reflection

e can view Daniel 6 as a paradigm of our discipleship journey or of a particular adversity we go through in our faith pilgrimage. Trials are normal in biblical discipleship (Rom 5:1-5; Heb 10:32-36; Jas 1:2-4; 1 Pet 1:6-9). In trials, we are tested if we will follow the Lord faithfully, serve Him constantly and trust in Him steadfastly, at all costs, even if it means to be thrown into the lions' den and whether God shuts the lions' mouths or not (Dan 6:10, 16, 23).

Daniel 6 concludes with the glory of God as a crescendo (vv.25-27). This is always the divine intention for all our discipleship trials – but contingent on us passing the test and being approved by God (Jas 1:12). Discipleship trials are for the glory of God and are all about the glory of God. So, we make the glory of God as central in our trials. This divine glory is seen in the **revelation of God**. God revealed Himself through Daniel's faithfulness to Him and His deliverance of His servant. God revealed Himself as "the living God", the everlasting God – "enduring forever", the reigning God – "His kingdom...His dominion" and the saving God – "He delivers and rescues" (vv.26b-27). And God's deliverance was manifested in three dimensions: by "signs and wonders", "in heaven and on earth" and "from the power of the lions" (v.27). God does not reveal Himself in abstraction, but in real life, in tangible ways. The revelation of God is a reality to be experienced. So, we see God in our trials and God shines in our trials.

deeper reflection

his week leading up to Step Up Sunday, we will reflect on Christian service and ask the Lord to lead and guide us in our thoughts and actions to better serve Him in the days ahead.

Christian service first and foremost is service to God. In serving God, Christians serve the people amongst whom God puts or sends them. Christian service is to be modelled after Jesus' example. He is both the Son of God and the Son of Man – fully God and fully man. Jesus took on human flesh without ceasing to be God the Son. Since Jesus is God, He could rightly have required to be served by all people – creatures whom God created in His image. However, Jesus came among people "not to be served but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many" (v.45). Jesus is the most striking example of humility and He expects His followers to imitate His way in their lives. Indeed, humble service to others is the path to greatness in the sight of God.

Jesus' supreme act of service to humankind was to give His life as an atoning sacrifice on the cross for the sins of the world. A person's sins are fully forgiven if and when that person believes in Jesus – who He is and what He has done to make that forgiveness possible. A person thus forgiven by God is considered righteous by God and accepted into God's family of redeemed sinners. The child of God, grateful for God's mercy and grace, willingly submits to the Lordship of Jesus and joyfully follows Him in obedience.

ur service to God should be **motivated by our love for Him** (v.14). Do you know how much Jesus loves you? He loves us beyond what we can humanly comprehend. The magnitude of His love – its breadth, length, height and depth – can only be known (albeit still in part) by us through God's enabling. Jesus' love saw Him willingly suffer and die on the cross for our sake. The sinless One willingly bore our sins in His body. The righteous One chose to die for the unrighteous. He was forsaken by the Father so that we do not have to be abandoned by God. So great is Christ's love for us and the salvation that we have in Him! He is our glorious Lord and risen Saviour, worthy of all our worship! "Love so amazing, so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all!"

Only love for God, overflowing from a grateful heart, can motivate joyful worship and a lifetime of loving service to Him and therefore to your neighbour. Our love for Christ leads us to live for Christ. Our love for self leads us to live for self. Our hearts are naturally oriented towards the self. The Holy Spirit works in the Christian to produce a God-oriented heart. The process is lifelong and can often be painful because it involves the surrender of one's heart and reorientation of one's soul. Let us yield to the Holy Spirit, so that our hearts will increasingly love the Lord, and therefore people in His name and for His sake.

deeper reflection

th full integrity, the Apostle Paul described his ministry to the Ephesian Christians as one of "serving the Lord with all humility" (v.19a). Paul was confident that the church elders could testify that this was his consistent conduct throughout the two years that he spent with them (vv.17-18; cf. Acts 19:1, 8-10). Paul had put the interests of the Ephesians and the other residents of Asia before his own interests. Boldly and persistently, he proclaimed the Gospel to the locals and visiting businesspeople in public places and private homes (vv.20-21). Consequently, many Jews and Greeks heard the Word of the Lord. It was hard work requiring much humility. Paul experienced considerable heartache, sacrifice and personal suffering as a result of serious opposition: "with tears and with trials that happened to me through the plot of the Jews" (v.19b). Paul was **imitating the Lord's** example of self-emptying humility (Phil 2:5-8). In Paul's letter to the church in Philippi, he exhorts the Christians to "do nothing from rivalry or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others." (Phil 2:3-4).

The Apostle Peter, too, understood humility in Christian service from Christ's example of suffering for the sake of His people (1 Pet 5:1). Peter urged church elders to shepherd the people of God in a worthy manner – **serve willingly, eagerly and humbly as examples** to church members (1 Pet 5:2-3). All the believers were to relate humbly with one another, for "**God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble**" (1 Pet 5:5).

deeper reflection

od has entrusted to us various resources like time, abilities and money, as well as certain people (under our care and leadership) for whom we are responsible to varying extents. These may include our younger siblings, elderly parents, children, subordinates at our workplaces and followers in our church community. For Christians, our stewardship of life ought to matter a great deal to us because Jesus Christ is our Master and Lord in life.

Stewardship means there is a trust relationship between the master and the steward. The master is the owner, not the steward. The master possesses rights, the steward responsibilities. Thus, the steward is to carry out his duties **in accordance with the master's instructions and in furtherance of the master's interests**. The steward cannot do as he wishes or deems fit without reference to the master. The steward must act in ways consistent with the master's character and values; she must not act in ways that bring the master's name into disrepute.

Micah 6:8 tells us that God has certain basic requirements for His people to "to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God". Ecclesiastes 12:13-14 tell us that everyone has a duty to "fear God and keep His commandments", and that God will judge every deed we have done, including every secret thing. 2 Corinthians 5:9-10 tell us that God's people are to "make it our aim to please Him", because we will one day appear before the judgment seat of Christ to account for everything that we have done in our lifetime and receive our dues.

triday **23**

Christian Service and Spiritual Gifts

SCRIPTURE 1 Corinthians 12:4-11; 1 Peter 4:10-11

OBSERVATION

What do you learn about spiritual gifts from these two Bible passages?

APPLICATION

How can I be a better steward of the spiritual gifts that God has given to me?

PRAYER

praver pointers

deeper reflection

piritual gifts are ministry abilities given and empowered by God's Spirit in each Christian. The Apostle Paul described such abilities as "the manifestation of the Spirit" (v.7). There are four key truths to note. First, spiritual gift(s) are given to each Christian as a matter of God's gracious choice – "to each is given" (v.7) by the Holy Spirit "who apportions to each one individually as He wills" (v.11). Since these gifts of "God's varied grace" (1 Pet 4:10) are given to Christians by God's gracious choice, we should not compare or compete with one another. Instead, we should celebrate one another and our respective gifts.

Second, there are various spiritual gifts. The lists of gifts found here and elsewhere in the New Testament²³ are non-identical, differently categorised and non-exhaustive. While each Christian has at least one gift, none has all the gifts. Therefore, we need one another. With mutual respect and honour, let us **collaborate with one another** using our complementary gifts to serve God.

Third, spiritual gifts are empowered by God (vv.6, 11). Christians cannot properly exercise their gifts independently from God. We must **prayerfully depend on God**; His Spirit provides us the needed words, wisdom, knowledge, faith, power, discernment and strength.

Fourth, spiritual gifts are to be used for God's purposes and glory – "for the common good" (v.7), "to serve one another" (1 Pet 4:10) and "in order that in everything God may be glorified through Jesus Christ" (1 Pet 4:11).²⁴ To be "good stewards" (1 Pet 4:10) who **serve and glorify God**, we must use our gifts to build up God's people and proclaim Christ to unbelievers.

deeper reflection

esus was clear about His mission. At the start of His public ministry,²⁵ Jesus went to the synagogue in His hometown Nazareth on the Sabbath day and declared that He was anointed by the Holy Spirit to proclaim Good News to the poor, liberty to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed and to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour (vv.18-19). Jesus had been sent by God to proclaim the Good News of salvation to those who until then had no hope of deliverance from their dire situations and were in desperate need of the Lord in His mercy and grace to save them. The Good News, or Gospel, was of Jesus Himself, the Messiah who has come as the way of the Lord in the wilderness for the salvation of sinners.²⁶

When the Church was likewise sent by Jesus to carry out God's mission in the world (Jn 20:21-22; Matt 28:18-20), the Lord's servants were likewise to be anointed and empowered by God's Spirit **to proclaim the Gospel to a dying world in need of the Saviour.**²⁷ Who will believe the Gospel and be saved? Those who humble themselves before God, confess that the godless way in which they have lived their lives in the past was sinful and wrong, believe in God's Son Jesus Christ as their Saviour, and follow Him as their Lord all the days of their lives, looking forward to His return at the end of the age to take them to be with Him forever to see and share in His glory.²⁸

deeper reflection

his week we will be reflecting on the theme of **Our Work in God's Hands** using Scripture texts taken from the Joseph
narrative (Gen 37-50). Joseph was one of the twelve sons of Jacob.²⁹
When he was 17 years old, he was sold by his brothers into slavery. At the
age of 30, he became the second most powerful person in the whole of
Egypt. A story of a man's success despite major setbacks in life.

The Scriptures tell us clearly that the singular reason for Joseph's success at work was that God was with him: the presence of the Lord. Two key principles to remember: 1. Success and God's presence go together. When God is with a person, He delights in him and is pleased to grant him success. This was the case for Joseph. Likewise for King David.³⁰ After the Incarnation, Death, Resurrection and Ascension of Jesus Christ, God the Father and God the Son sent God the Holy Spirit to live in everyone who believes in Jesus.³¹ Thus, God's presence is with every Christian to lead, guide and empower him to do God's will for God's glory.³² However, the Christian will need to submit to and obey the Holy Spirit for success and fruitfulness.³³ 2. Success comes from **keeping God's Word**. His Word is truth and guides His people in His righteous ways. When God's people carefully obey His Word, they will experience God's favour, protection and blessing.³⁴ When we consistently live out God's attributes of steadfast love and faithfulness in our lives, we will enjoy favour and good success in the sight of God and man.35

tnesday **27**

Dealing with Sexual Temptations

SCRIPTURE Genesis 39:1-20

OBSERVATION

What significant observations can you make about the way Joseph responded to Mrs Potiphar's sexual advances?

APPLICATION

How will I deal with sexual temptations in my workplace?

PRAYER

praver pointers

- Give thanks and praise
- Pray for pastors and staff: To always be on guard against sexual temptations in the context of their ministry work wherever it may take place
- Pray for significant people
- Pray for those in need
- Pray for self

deeper reflection

rs Potiphar's sexual advances were relentless. "Day after day" (v.10) she asked Joseph to sleep with her. Despite the constant pressure, Joseph refused to betray his master Potiphar's trust and would not sin against God, his ultimate Master. Joseph gave clear moral reasoning in his firm response to his master's wife (vv.8-9) and took wise precautionary measures to stay away from her presence at the workplace (v.10). When she finally managed to corner Joseph, he quickly fled from the person, place and situation.

How should we deal with sexual temptations at the workplace?³⁶ 1. Simply flee from temptations. Don't entertain temptations – don't imagine the possibilities nor take any step towards them. Like Joseph, quickly turn and run away (v.12). Don't stay to rationalise or try to manage temptations, because we are prone to deception by self and the devil. Do a fast getaway from that person, place and situation. "Flee from sexual immorality" (1 Cor 6:18a). Such temptations are commonly faced, but each of us has a choice to flee and take the escape route that God provides (1 Cor 10:13-14). 2. "Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you. Draw near to God, and He will draw near to you." (Jas 4:7-8a). **3. Seek prayer intercession** by two or three close Christian friends whom you trust: "I'm facing these temptations... Please pray for me." We recall that when our Lord Jesus was experiencing great anguish and internal struggle shortly before going to the cross, He sought out Peter, James and John, and asked them to watch and pray with Him (see Matt 26:36-41).

Stewarding Power and Authority

SCRIPTURE Genesis 41:14-57

OBSERVATION

What prepared Joseph for the reversal of fortunes in his life and how did he respond to God's gift of power and authority?

APPLICATION

How can I use the power and authority that have been entrusted to me by God to do good to the people of the land?

PRAYER

deeper reflection

oseph interpreted Pharaoh's dream with clarity. A very severe sevenyear famine was coming after seven years of plentiful harvest. Joseph emphasised to Pharoah that the interpretation was revealed by God, and not something Joseph could understand on his own (vv.16, 25, 28, 32). The Lord was also the source of Joseph's wisdom in his famine response proposal. This fact was clearly perceived by Pharoah – so evident it was that God's Spirit was in Joseph (vv.37-38). Totally impressed, Pharoah immediately promoted Joseph to be his second-in-command over "all the land of Egypt"³⁷ despite his not being an Egyptian³⁸ and his young age of 30!

What prepared Joseph for this meteoric rise from the prison to the palace, and promotion beyond all expectations to the second highest political office? One commentator insightfully wrote:³⁹

Before Pharaoh promoted him, Joseph knew that the Lord was with him and he had tangible evidence to prove it. **Repeatedly giving God credit was not only the right thing to do, but it also reminded Joseph himself that his skills were from the Lord**. Joseph was courteous and humble, showing a desire to do whatever he could to help Pharaoh and the Egyptian people. Even when the Egyptians were bereft of currency and livestock, Joseph earned the trust of the Egyptian people and of Pharaoh himself (v.55). Throughout the rest of his life as an administrator, Joseph **consistently devoted himself to effective management for the good of others**.

Joseph remained a humble servant of the Lord by the consistent practices of giving credit to God and using power⁴⁰ to do good to the people of the land.

Forgiveness from the Heart

SCRIPTURE Genesis 50:14-21

OBSERVATION

What does this Scripture passage tell us about whether Joseph had fully forgiven his brothers for their sin committed against him in the past?

APPLICATION

In what way is the Lord leading me to fully forgive the sin that a particular person, for example my colleague, committed against me in the past?

PRAYER

prayer pointers

- Give thanks and praise
- Pray for Outreach/Missions/New Life leaders: To receive grace from God and thereby be able to give grace to people who have caused them offence or hurt
- Pray for significant people

deeper reflection

his Scripture passage tells us that Joseph truly and completely forgave his brothers for their sin against him. It was not that Joseph restrained haimself and treated them well for their father Jacob's sake while he was alive. The most telling words that reveal the depth of Joseph's forgiveness towards his brothers were these: "So do not fear; I will provide for you and your little ones (v.21)."

It was no small thing for Joseph to forgive his brothers for the betrayal and evil that they had committed against him in the past. The young Joseph suffered grievously when they threw him into a pit and thereafter sold him to Midianite traders, who brought him to Egypt and sold him as a slave to Potiphar (Gen 37:23-28, 36). Joseph must have been sobbing and shaking with distress as he begged his brothers for mercy and pleaded with them to let him go home. Joseph must also have experienced abject fear as he was forcibly restrained and taken away by the Midianite traders. He would certainly have suffered severe emotional trauma as a result of being separated from his parents, taken to a foreign land, not knowing what his captors will do to him and what will become of him in the future. During the harrowing journey to Egypt, young Joseph must have cried out again and again to the Lord for deliverance.

How could the adult Joseph not harbour anger and resentment in his heart towards his brothers nor seek revenge? Two key practices: (1) Joseph recognised God's blessings in his life;⁴² and (2) Joseph submitted himself to God's will.⁴³

The Sovereignty of God

SCRIPTURE Genesis 45:3-11; 50:18-21

OBSERVATION

Looking back on his life, how did Joseph see God's sovereign hand and good purpose in the way events panned out?

APPLICATION

How can I respond in a godly manner to the setbacks, disappointments and pain that I experienced in my working life?

PRAYER

praver pointers

- Give thanks and praise
- Pray for SGI leaders: To recognise and rest in the sovereignty of God in their work and ministry
- Pray for significant people
- Pray for those in need
- Pray for self

deeper reflection

n our work life,⁴⁴ we need to recognise and rest in the sovereignty of God. God is in sovereign control over all of our lives.⁴⁵ It is not that we do not have the freedom to make choices in the course of our lives, but that God superintends our lives – and indeed all of human history – to bring things to pass in accordance with His sovereign will and purposes.⁴⁶

As Christians, recognising and resting in the sovereignty of God in our work will provide us many benefits, such as lesser fear and frustration, and lower stress and anxiety, when we encounter setbacks at work or when things are not turning out the way we would prefer or expect. Not only has God revealed Himself in the Scriptures as the Sovereign Lord of all creation, He has also revealed to us His attributes of steadfast love and faithfulness towards His covenant people.⁴⁷ We must by faith hold fast to the biblical beliefs that God loves us and has our best interests at heart, and that God alone has perfect knowledge⁴⁸ and the fullest perspective on our situations. Then we will be able to maintain our stability in the storms.

With the benefit of hindsight, Joseph recognised God's good hand upon his life over all the years, including all the times of pain and suffering that he had to go through. What Joseph had to previously hold fast by faith, now he could see clearly that God had a good and glorious purpose for the blessing of God's people through His servant, and bringing salvation to all the nations of the earth.
